# Responding to anti-migrant protests

The Methodist Church is committed to being a justice-seeking church, acting with people who are experiencing marginalisation or other forms of discrimination. What common ground is there with people who are facing homelessness, or finding health support or a struggle for school places, without turning to the false and easy answers of scapegoating those who are seen as 'different'? How can people who may feel alienated know that they are loved by God?

In a church that sees diversity as gift rather than challenge, a generous response to those of other faith and a desire to engage in dialogue are signs not of weakness but of strength. The Christian faith that the Methodist Church has taught me is based on a broad interpretation of God's purposes, one which is open to receiving and learning from those other faiths whilst at the same time holding fast to the unique significance of God's saving acts in Christ.

Rev Richard Andrew and Matthew Forsyth, the President and Vice-President of the Methodist Conference, have made a statement following the announcement of the UK's recognition of the State of Palestine.

Methodist leaders, including the President and Vice-President of the Methodist Conference, have also joined with those from other church traditions to sign a letter expressing concerns about movements that seek to inflame societal division and the co-opting of Christian symbols, particularly the cross, during last week's 'Unite the Kingdom' rally.

With tensions rising in communities across the UK, the Methodist Church has released a new recording of the hymn 'Let us build a house where love can dwell', known to many as 'All Are Welcome'. More than 140 Methodist churches contributed their voices to the project.
